Held every two years, the conference reunites past participants to share special moments, learn what members are doing in their respective countries and especially to renew and strengthen their commitment to the Olympic Movement.

Our association has come a long way from its beginnings in the summer of 1989. This has been possible through the constant work of some of our long time members and the constant support and help given by the International Olympic Academy, especially by Mr. Nikos Filaretos, the President of the IOA, Dr. Kostas Georgiadis, the Dean of the IOA, and Mr. Athanasios Kritsinelis, IOA Technical Engineer and former director of the Olympic Torch Relay, who were an inspiration to our Association.

In Memorial: John Talbot Powell, 1919-2000

On October 31, 2000 the Olympic Movement, and the IOAPA particularly, lost a dear friend, when Dr. John Talbot Powell died at the age of 81.


In 1972 Dr. Powell began a 24-year association with the IOA serving as lecturer and discussion group coordinator. During that time he touched all of our lives. In 1981 He was awarded a silver medal by the IOA.

As a college student he was a championship runner who hoped to participate in the Olympic Games. Those hopes were dashed with the outbreak of World War II. During the War he served seven years in the British army and was wounded in action.

A senior lecturer at Rhodes University in South Africa (1948-1959) he earned his Ph.D. from the University of Illinois (USA) in 1964. In 1965 he joined the faculty of the University of Guelph (Canada) which continued until his death.

As an athletics coach at Cambridge, Rhodes, Illinois and Guelph he conducted 140 coaching clinics worldwide and 19 of his athletes won Olympic medals.

A leader in the study of Human Kinetics, he was honored by Guelph in 1993 when the Human Biology Building was re-named the J.T. Powell Building.



He is survived by his wife, Joan, three children and 10 grandchildren.

As the Greek playwright Sophocles wrote, "One must wait until the evening to see how wonderful the day has been." It is hoped that Dr. Powell was able to look back and see how wonderful his day had been, and how he had made our lives richer by his presence. We can be assured that when our evening comes we will be able to look back and see that our day has been wonderful due to people like Dr. Powell who touched all our lives.

A fitting epithet for Dr. Powell would be the final stanza of a poem he penned, OLYMPIA.

SO WE OLYMPIA'S VALE HAVE
COME
AND IN SILENT RAPTURE WE WILL GO
QUIETER THAN WHEN ALPHEUS RIVER'S
FLOW
MEETS THE FAR DEEPS OF THE SEA.

The Sydney Games: A Canadian's perspective, Charlotte MacNaughton

I had the privilege of working with the Canadian Olympic Team in Sydney. It was my first time working on the mission staff and it was an incredible experience - both professionally and personally.

Sydney is a remarkable city. It's stunningly beautiful. The architecture there is extraordinary - including the design of the Olympic venues. Sydney Olympic Park is fascinating... to have so many venues in such a concentrated area. It was awesome to see that many people in one place.

The Canadian Olympic Team's headquarters outside the village were at Macquarie University in the City of Ryde (just north of Sydney). We had families of Canadian athletes, Canadian Olympic Association sponsors, team personnel and other Canadians staying at the University. We also had a huge lounge area where Canadians could gather to watch the Olympic Games on CBC (Canada's Olympic broadcaster). It was a great opportunity to catch up on how Canadian athletes were doing at the Games. We also had our store there where we sold lots and

One of my jobs in Sydney was to help with the special events that we organized at Canada Olympic Place. We had parties for the opening and closing ceremonies, medal celebrations for Canadian medallists, various

sponsor events and various community events. This was lots of work very intense, but a lot of fun.

I did manage to get to some events (mountain biking, track cycling, diving and synchronized swimming) during my free time. All of these venues were amazing. I also did get to a couple great Arts Festival events. Hats off to SOCOG for their incredible organization.

I have unforgettable Sydney memories, including the wonderful weather (I came home on Oct 4th to an early season snow storm in Calgary - that was a shock!) the amazingly friendly and helpful Austrians that I met, the beauty of Sydney (I look forward to going back one day when I have more free time so that I can explore the city and its surroundings) the strong friendships that I made with the people I worked with (very similar to my IOA experience!)

Being from Calgary and seeing the incredible legacy that an Olympic Games can create for a community, I wish Sydney a long-lasting legacy from these Games.

This lovely event was held in the Art Museum of New South Wales -- beautiful venue! The BEST gathering of all was at our Penn State "reunion party"

to which I had invited a couple of IOA-PAers....and Penn State was happy to have them at the party!! So...who came? Peter Dawson (GBR), Wikka (Sri Lanka/ Wales), and Philip Barker (GBR)! It was a thoroughly enjoyable time together -- way too short, however. And, altho' the party was to continue at Peter's afterward, I had to leave with my SOCOG hostess and friend to return home for a very early departure



to the States.

I am sure there were many more IOAPA notables in attendance at Peter's abode who enjoyed the rest of the evening/night....On a closing note, I must say that during one week at the Games, I felt Olympism alive in every part of the city, at the Olympic Park and other venues, and in the faces/actions of every volunteer! Sydney could not have been a better choice for host city -- and I was fascinated by the events which I attended archery, equestrian, sailing and men's triathlon. It was a truly Olympic experience in every sense, and I look forward to Athens 2004!

IOAPA Activity in South America

Day by Day, by Silvia Dalotto (Argentina)

How many times do we have the chance to do little things that makes the Olympic Movement grow...day by day? How many times is what we do go unnoticed by so many people but make us feel that we are helping to make a better world... day by day?

That is what I do, that is the way I feel every time I speak about Olympism.

I have been developing activities that are not major events but simple meetings with students and I feel the flame of the Olympic Movement born in some of their hearts.

The Olympic Games are very motivational, not just for athletes but also for people and was a great event to make others aware that the Olympic Movement is much more than 16 days of sport at the elite level.

I spoke with teachers that have had their students investigate Olympic History. Then we had meetings, in four different schools, with students of different ages, from 10 to 17 years of age.

Just this year the Journalist Sport School opened in my city. I went there on September 14, only hours before the Olympic Opening Ceremonies. For 3 hours we discussed the importance of the Games in our world. It was very interesting and the media is one of the best ways to let the people know what is going on before, during and after the Games, and all that Olympic philosophy entails. I am positive they will include Olympism in the study programme after that three hours.

The city of Villaguay (200 km away from my city) organised a meeting with 120 students in the only cinema in the city, The Education Secretary and the Sport Office where responsible for that. How incredible is the feeling to motivate young people in Olympic education!!!!...

Mendoza (a city in the west of Argentina, 1000km from my city) invited me to a multidisciplinary symposium. One day, out of five, was dedicated to Olympic subjects. I was the only woman invited to talk about Women and the Olympic Movement .

The Argentine Olympic Academy session will be held between October 23 and 27. I will attend, as a lecturer, along with 42 participants. Women and the Olympic History and The International Olympic Academy will be my two presentations. But I will also have the pleasure to be there the whole week as the only coordinator of the session. The President, the secretary of the AOA and I will have the honour of working for five days with the same values that we have shared many times in Olympia. From Buenos Aires I will travel directly to Guayaquil, where the Ecuadorian Olympic Academy will be held November 1st to 5th. Two presentations there and the happiness to meet again with Ecuadorian friends, friends from abroad, and live what I am sure will be another great opportunity to develop Olympic education in South

America. I know, after the session I will have many fantastic moments to share with all of you.

Day by day we are trying to grow in our region. In August 18th, 25 people met in the city of Cordoba, located in central Argentina. The whole country was represented. Seven were former IOA participants and we formed the Argentine Olympic Academy Participants Association, with our own rules and representatives. We have been accepted by our NOC and the president of the AOA was with us during the three day session. Soon we will have our own web page.

Uruguay and Ecuador are also working toward the same goal and I am sure we will soon talk about new associations being created there. Carlos Manzur offered us the possibility to organise in his country a IOAPA regional meeting. That is our next goal... Day by day...doing a little more ...

The Ecuadorian Olympic Academy (EOA) held its third session between the 1st and 5th November 2000. We was generously invited to attend the conference by the President of the EOA, Ab. Carlos Manzur. We were very honoured with this invitation and accepted wholeheartedly.

The Third Ecuadorian Olympic Academy, by Carlos Farrugia (Malta) & Silvia Dalotto (Argentina)

The session, November 1-5, was structured similar to that for young participants held in Olympia, only over a shorter period. The over 50 participated and the EOA had to refuse other applications due to the limited space available. The participants came from Ecuador, Peru, Uruguay, Venezuela, Cuba, and Argentina. The opening ceremony was simple but effective with the president of the Ecuadorian Olympic Committee delivering the opening speech, followed by other distinguished guests. The session was excellently organised by the EOA and Prof. Cesar Torres, who was the Academic Director. Distinguished personalities delivered their presentations, namely Arturo Gamboa (ECU), Carlos Manzur (ECU), Cesar Torres (ARG), Rodolfo Cremer (PER), Sabino Hernandez (ECU), Silvia Dalotto (ARG), Ernesto Canizares (ECU), Dr. Galo Narvaez (ECU), Jan Paterson (GBR), and Pedro Rivero (VEN). All the presentations were very well received by the participants who asked interesting questions and were very much involved themselves. Topics discussed included the Ancient and Modern Olympic Games, the Olympic Movement and its Symbols, Doping and Violence in Sport, Fair Play, Women in Sport and Olympic Education. Interest was high and many constructive debates ensued after the presentations.

The purpose of this section is to promote Olympism by featuring some of the myriad of Olympic sites that

have been created. PE Links 4 U brings to its readers at just a click away, Internet based resources (online kits, interactive resources etc.) which teachers can use if they are interested in developing an Olympic Education Programs in their school. No longer do teachers have to scour hours for Olympic related resources - PE LINKS 4 U brings them to you. We have been doing this very successfully - with every biweekly issue we featured 3-4 Internet sites that have been of tremendous use to teachers.

This is a site maintained by committed PE professionals and students from Central Washington University. Besides providing very extensive links (hence why it is called PE LINKS 4 U), the site features a newsletter which is now being deliv-
