With official sessions having concluded for 2022, we are quickly turning our attention to 2023 with initiatives to continue supporting IOA activities as well as planning for the most important event in our biennial calendar, the IOAPA Session.

After having hosted the most attended session in our history in 2019, we will continue with our virtual platform but also expand it to incorporate the return of our traditional in-person event in Olympia. I am therefore excited to announce that the 18th IOAPA Session 2022 will be held in two parts – a virtual weekend in April and then the continuation of the session in Olympia for one week in June.

The opening virtual session will incorporate web-based activities, lectures, the business of the association and the election of the new Executive Committee for 2023-2025. The in-person portion of session in Olympia will then host our traditional suite of events including lectures, relaxing tours around Elis, our famous pool party and banquet at the Magna Grecia olive production estate. Finally, our newly elected Executive Committee will be inaugurated at the end of the Session. We will be announcing more information on these events and how to get involved in the weeks to come, so be sure to check your inbox and our social media platforms for updates.

I am also proud to announce that applications will soon open for the 2023 Hans van Haute Scholarship, which for the first time will cover full accommodation and transportation to Olympia for the recipient. This additional bursary addresses a key systemic barrier that many applicants have faced over the years in applying for the scholarship, and we are hopeful that this initiative will assist in ensuring that our Session is more representative of our members around the world. We wish to thank in advance the support of Franca Magrini and Agriturismo Magna Grecia, without who's support this would not have been possible. More information on how to apply for the scholarship will be announced in the coming weeks.

There is a lot of work already underway, and we look forward to sharing all the exciting activities we have planned for you, our members, as we build to 2023!

62ND INTERNATIONAL SESSION FOR YOUNG OLYMPIC AMBASSADORS

IOAPA Executive Committee

This session is considered as the main session of the International Olympic Academy, from the very first year of the IOA's establishment, in 1961, under the name "International Session for Young Participants" and since then is being successfully organized every year, opening the Academy's educational season. The title of the Session was changed to "International Session for Young Olympic Ambassadors" as a result of the discussions between the IOA and IOC. In addition, the IOA has also proceeded to a change in the structure and the activities of the session, in an effort to better respond to its mission to disseminate the Olympic Values through Olympic Education.

117 young men and women from 74 countries as well as 7 lecturers, 19 coordinators and 12 observers participated in this session, which traditionally opens with an exciting ceremony at the Hill of Pnyx. The main subject of this year's Session, that took place at the renovated IOA facilities in Ancient Olympia, was "The Olympic Movement and Olympism in digital era" and its special subject focused on the "The promotion of physical activity via digital engagement strategies and virtual sports". Notably, many of this session's participants attended the on-line sessions in 2020 and 2021 and came with high anticipation of actually being in Olympia.

The session's topic was covered by the following lecturers: Prof. Dr. Jim PARRY (GBR), Dr. Alberto CARRIO SAMPEDRO (ESP), Assoc. Prof. Ian BRITTAIN (GBR), Prof. Dr. Emilio FERNÁNDEZ PEÑA (ESP), Dr. George ILIOU (GRE), Prof. Vincent PEREIRA (IOC), Ms. Zhang HONG (CHN). They all come from various backgrounds, each being an expert in their field, in order to introduce the participants the spirit of the new digital era of the Olympic Movement. Alongside the lectures, the academic program has been enriched with two workshops. One on the subject of "Olympism and Olympic Education" with Prof. Konstantinos GEORGIADIS (GRE) and the other one on the subject of "We are Olympic Media: Seminar on Social Media Audiovisual Reporting" with Prof. FERNÁNDEZ PEÑA.

As part of the program, the participants had the opportunity to attend guided visits to the Acropolis museum as well as to the archaeological site and the museum of Ancient Olympia. The extracurricular program, which was organized by the coordinators (40% IOAPA members), included activities such as Sport Tournaments, Social Evenings, Arts Workshops, Track and Field Competition, Torch Relay, Olympic Day Run and Film Projection.

Last but not least is the Olympians and Paralympians presentations, which serve a vital part of this Session. This year, 10 athletes shared their personal experience and as always it has been consensus that each of them particularly touched and inspired every person in the lecture hall.

LOOKING DOWN FROM THE OLYMPIC SKIES

If the rarity of the event makes it worthwhile, allow me to address you in poetry.

My heart has been resting here for 85 years, waiting for you to come and feel this energy. I won a gold medal at the 1912 Stockholm Olympics with beautiful rhymes, so much so that I can't resist talking to you like this. Born Frédy dit Pierre on January 1st 1863 in Paris, I made the introduction of sport in schools the first battle of my life. As a teacher, I travelled the world to defend the right to sweat, to see bodies reddened. And no matter the critics, even those who denounced my Anglomania. Ennobled in 1477, the Coubertins are lords, I do not betray this attachment to aristocracy. To be an "amateur" is not only to refuse the degrading condition of the professional sportsman from the slums, It is also to distinguish oneself from the men of leisure who play sport, but that's not the case. So I tried to invent a sociological category, the sportsmen, a new chivalry. I was neither a revolutionary nor a reactionary, rather a reformist and a conservative, although some proposed the word 'evolutionary' in a biography. I was a defender of freedom and property, claiming the legacy of the French Revolution of 1789, a great year of frenzy. I gave more reforming capacity to social action than to political action, which is one of the reasons why I watched over the independence of sports societies with such jealousy. Very early on, as a victim of political repression, I staked my hopes on sports internationalism through the renewal of the Olympic Games. In fact, this idea was the brainchild of two members of the Permanent International Peace Bureau, Hodgson Pratt and Frédéric Passy, they proposed to organize athletic and peaceful encounters between foreign students to prevent conflicts. Peace education, and peace through education, is excellent diplomacy! So I promulgated the renovation of the Olympic Games in June 1894 to the great delight of the delighted Hellenists. It was clear to me, however, that it was not a question of restoring the Games to their original form, which would only be a pale copy. On the contrary, it was necessary to promote modern sports, those of the Anglo-Saxons such as rugby. Not forgetting athletics, lawn tennis, rowing and velocipedes... My skill was to use a concept borrowed from Antiquity, which federates, beyond the rivalries of a still bruised Europe. Athens, Paris, London, Stockholm... oops, I forget about Saint Louis in the United States, on the eve of the war, I drew a white flag with five rings to symbolize the united continents, It is added to the Olympic oath, a bulwark against all barbarism, and to the flame that lights up the night. Oh what an illustrious privilege it is to be the last torchbearer, isn't it Ms. Osaka Naomi? With so much excitement, my reputation travels, reaching all your countries.

It is curious to me today that I am often more loved in your country than where I grew up. I am sometimes criticised for having moved the IOC headquarters to Switzerland in 1915, and also my position on women's sport, which has changed thanks to Alice Milliat, a genius leader. You are too young to have known the confrontations with the sports leaders of my decade, they were Frantz Reichel or Chasseloup-Laubat, there were many marquises!

They wanted to create international federations, and challenged the IOC's hegemony. So when I refused the Legion of Honour and the Pantheon, jealousy pushed me into oblivion. Two years before the Olympic and Paralympic Games in Paris, after Albertville, Grenoble and Chamonix, I am moved that France and the youth of the world are rediscovering my philosophy. You are the 2024 generation, who share the values of friendship, respect and excellence to guide your lives. By taking part in the IOA Youth Ambassador session, you have experienced the combination of a balanced set of qualities of body, will and mind. Like a glimmer of dawn dappling with rays of light this amphitheatre finally filled, I have waited too long for your return and this ceremony. To you first, who are all great, to the organisers, too, for their dedication and the welcome to Olympia, I think there is only one thing left to say: thank you, see you in Paris.

SERENDIPITY IN DENMARK

In early August I traveled to Denmark with an equestrian friend, to attend the World Equestrian Games/Championships sponsored by the FEI (International Equestrian Federation), for two exciting weeks of dressage, vaulting and para-dressage in Herning. Our tour group was a good size: 18 enthusiastic equestrian men and women from Florida, California, Vermont, Colorado, Montana, North Carolina, Bermuda, and Peru! ~ and two of us from Pennsylvania. Our hotel was in Viborg, situated on a lovely lake where there was ample time for leisurely walks each morning after breakfast and before we boarded our 45-minute bus ride for the day's events just outside the city of Herning. Note: Denmark won the team dressage gold!!! The competitions were extraordinary and the day trips to various places, including the west coast on the North Sea, were special. However, the 'icing on the cake' was getting together with IOAPA friends Tove Thomassen and her family (including their beautiful Icelandic sheepdog, "Sam"), Erling Joensen and his wife Ann, and Thomas Idskov and his wife, Pia. Tove was my tour guide for a couple of 'free' days, and toward the end of my stay, Erling and Ann hosted all of us for a classic Danish dinner, complete with an absolutely delicious Danish cake made by Pia! The highlight of the evening was a grand tour by Erling of his Viborg Idraetshojskole (sport school) where he is Headmaster! So... what was serendipitous about this trip? On the day of departure, I happened to hear Greek being spoken by three people, a young woman and her family, on our bus at the Billund airport where we were being bused to our next destination, heading for our respective home countries. Naturally, I spoke a bit of Greek and engaged the woman in conversation! Marianna told me that she had brought two para-dressage athletes from her Riding Academy in Crete to compete. It was the first time that Greeks had qualified and she was very excited for her athletes. She gave me her business card and told me that it was the only riding academy in Greece but she hoped the word would soon spread! I told her I'd get in contact with our Paralympic specialist, Ian Brittain, and let him know about her success with para-dressage athletes. The two of them are now in contact (networking is one of my favorite 'sports'!). She also emailed me several photos from her Academy of para-dressage athletes. One is always an 'ambassador' in one way or another after attending the IOA and one never knows when an opportunity will arise to speak about the IOA. It would be wonderful for her to attend the IOA as a Greek participant or even a lecturer in the future! Marianna Grammatikaki is the Riding Instructor for her Riding Academy in Iraklion, Crete (www.ridingacademy.gr). She is hoping to make para-dressage more well-known in Greece and, eventually, to bring more athletes into the sport. Meeting Marianna was a perfect way to end my trip to Denmark!

Since the election of IOAPA's new Executive Committee last year, there was a renewed effort to strengthen the role of Country Coordinators within the IOAPA community. Country Coordinators have traditionally been an important part of IOAPA'S work. They are responsible for the coordination of the IOAPA members and all the former participants of the IOA sessions at the national level.

To work on the above goal, the Executive Committee appointed a Country-Coordinators sub-committee to work alongside the Head of Country Coordinators. 
