18TH IOAPA SESSION REPORT GETTING BACK TO OLYMPIA and GIVING BACK



Late in 2022, the Executive Committee took a decision to split the biennial session into two parts; an online business meeting for the General Assembly with a virtual election enabling more members to participate, and the traditional in-person session in Ancient Olympia. In this article, I'd like to concentrate mainly on the Session in Olympia.

The 18th IOAPA Session took place in Greece from June 4-11th after skipping the meeting in 2021, due to Covid-19. We wanted to deliver a really packed session, both fun and inspiring. Since we removed the business portion and election from the program, we had plenty of time for activities. The session planning committee of myself, Richard Koo (CAN), Alexander Eriksson (NOR), Yogo Suzuki (JPN), Caroline Bujold (CAN), and Dimitrios Regalos (GRE) managed the core of the program.

Early on we decided on a couple of new events to add to our program. A stop in Ancient Nemea provided a fun, first day activity for everyone. Most members had not visited Nemea and it is very close to the highway and is easily accessed. Nemea was one of the four locations for ancient Panhellenic games and is one of the few stadia in the world where the athlete's tunnel is still intact. Nemea was also excavated by Professor Stephen Miller (Berkeley, California), who lectured at the IOA often and instituted the Modern Nemean Games which takes place every four years.




On June 5th, 31 IOAPA members plus five guests from 22 countries arrived midafternoon at the IOA. After settling in, we gathered for an informal welcome in the Otto Szymiczek Hall followed with refreshments hosted by the Executive Committee.

The next day we started the session with a video message from IOA President Isidoros Kouvelos. We were honored at our formal Opening Ceremony by the presence of our special guest Alexandra de Navacelle de Coubertin and her husband John, on their first visit to Olympia. Alexandra was very gracious to say a few meaningful words at the laying of the wreath at the Coubertin Stele. Ulrich Rosen (GER), the outgoing IOAPA treasurer, gave a wonderfully inspirational message at the Carl Diem monument. We then proceeded to the Hans van Haute memorial tree to dedicate and install the new plaque denoting the tree's significance.

The theme of this year's session was "GIVING BACK". This exceptional topic allowed for some of the best presentations we have had in years. Four of our five guest speakers made live presentations, which included two workshops. It must be noted here that everyone who comes to the IOAPA session must pay all their own expenses to attend, so to have these exceptional people join us was a great tribute to their commitment to the Olympic Movement.

In addition, presentations were made by the four HvH scholarship awardees as well as seven of our members. Each presentation was followed by a question-and-answer period.

Witnessing history from Olympia to Singapore: The inaugural Olympic Esports Finals Week

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During the weekend following the 63rd International Session for Young Olympic Ambassadors, I had the amazing opportunity to visit for one day the inaugural Olympic Esports Series Finals held in Singapore from June 22nd to June 25th, 2023. For the country with a population of 6 million, this was another special chapter in its Olympic history and another milestone for the Olympic Movement in general, as Singapore also hosted the inaugural Youth Olympic Games in 2010. This time around, the Olympic Esports Finals Week was held in the Suntec Singapore Convention & Exhibition Centre, a multi-purpose venue that was transformed for the purposes of the occasion.

As one can imagine, the opening ceremony had it all and celebrated the convergence of the physical and the virtual world: beautiful graphics, laser projection, robotic automation, live performances, and even Thomas Bach, the IOC President, who appeared through holographic projection and thanked the Singaporean public authorities, the Organizing Committee and, of course, the more than 120 top players coming from 57 nations. He also praised the International Sports



Federations for working together with the esports community to develop the virtual format of their sport.

Indeed, this very first edition of the Olympic Esports Series, which culminated with the live, in-person Finals in Singapore, featured ten different games in the competition program: Archery (Tic Tac Bow), Baseball (WBSC eBASEBALL™: POWER PROS), Chess (Chess.com), Cycling (Zwift), Dance (Just Dance), Motorsport





(Gran Turismo), Sailing (Virtual Regatta), Shooting (ISSF Challenge featuring Fortnite), Tennis (Tennis Clash) and Taekwondo (Virtual Taekwondo). In addition, five additional games were featured in exhibition matches, namely Triathlon (Zwift), Table Tennis (ElevenVR), vehicular soccer video game (Rocket League), fighting game (Streetfighter6), and basketball (NBA2k23). Although online viewing numbers were arguably not very impressive, the event attracted 20,000 visitors to the venue, where they also had the opportunity to try out the virtual sports experience themselves in a specially built freeto-play zone. Overall, it was an invigorating experience to watch visitors of all ages immerse in the buzzing atmosphere, exuding enthusiasm as they played virtual sports games like rowing, darts, table tennis, golf, and boxing, to name a few.

While each game in the official program had its unique set of participation requirements, including hardware (e.g., PC, mobile) and software, some were exclusive invitation-only events, while others welcomed both professional and amateur players in worldwide qualification rounds. At the Finals, I was impressed by how the top players and teams displayed their concentration, hard work, skills, and passion for their games, living up to the Olympic Values of Excellence, Friendship, and Respect. I understand that there might be some skepticism regarding the inclusion of esports or virtual sports in the Olympic Program, but it shouldn't be seen as a black-or-white situation. On the contrary, I believe that an event like the Olympic Esports Series can be positioned in such a way that promotes the Olympic Values and an active way of living, while enabling the inclusion of a broader audience (players and fans) in (e-)sport and in becoming part of the Olympic family.

You can find more information on the dedicated page on the IOC's website, which also features useful resources to share with your community on optimizing the performance and well-being of players in esports, virtual sports, and beyond, available here. As an annual event, the Olympic Esports Finals Week 2024 has already received interest from other cities to host, such as Paris, Seoul, New York, Shenzhen, and Abu Dhabi, with the first one being the stronger candidate to host in parallel with the Paris 2024 Summer Olympics. Until we find out which city will host this event next year, I encourage all to explore more about esports and virtual sports as a new channel to share the Olympic Values with a broader audience and complement physical education and training.

Olympism Alive in the Small States of Europe

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Isn't it wonderful how every four years, the world unites in a spectacle of athletic brilliance, global camaraderie, and unwavering determination at the Olympic Games? From the mostly anticipated opening ceremony to the competitions that capture the eye of the world, the Olympics embodies the pinnacle of sporting achievement. But beyond this stunning stage lies another realm of determination, where smaller nations take centre stage and showcase their talents in the Games of Small States of Europe.

The Games of Small States of Europe (GSSE) is a multi-sport event hosted every two years, celebrating talents and friendly competition between European nations that have less than one million inhabitants. First hosted by San Marino in 1985, nine countries in Europe take part in 10 sporting disciplines. These include Andorra, Cyprus, Iceland, Luxembourg, Malta, Monaco, Montenegro, San Marino, and Lichtenstein. All these countries share a common goal throughout the games; to showcase and promote their athletic excellence with countries facing similar experiences and levels.

The year 2023 was Malta's turn to host the GSSE games from the 29th of May till the 3rd of June. Across the Mediterranean island, there was a sort of buzz in the air as the games drew closer. Being a small country of half a million in population size, these games allowed the Maltese population to rally around their home country and see them excel on such a big event on home soil. This year's mascot was named 'PUKA'! Puka comes after the typical Maltese fish 'Lampuka', dolphinfish in English.

The Maltese Olympic Academy (MOA) took the opportunity for its hosting duties to grow awareness of sport and Olympic Education amongst the Maltese population and school children. In preparation for the games, Olympic Educational material and books were distributed amongst children in local schools between the ages of 5 and 11. These books explain what the GSSE games are about, their history, information on the participating countries and an introduction to the Olympic Values. The MOC also organised the '2023 GSSE Roadshow', where each weekend an event is hosted in each town in Malta, promoting awareness of sports, participation, and increasing support leading up to the games.



One initiative that the MOA has been working on throughout the year is inviting different schools to have an Olympic Day Experience. School children are invited to the MOC headquarters, where they learn about Olympic history, have an Olympic quiz, and take a tour around the MOC Olympic Museum. Fun games involving running, jumping, and strength are also organised highlighting the Olympic Moto "Citius, Altius, Fortius - Communiter". The students also get to have their own opening ceremony completed with the Olympic Parade, Olympic Oath, their own accreditation, and hold an Olympic Torch!

The GSSE exemplifies the celebration of Olympic values through their unwavering commitment to embody the principles of excellence, friendship, and respect. Despite the smaller scale, these games embrace the core ideals of the Olympics and serve as a powerful testament to sportsmanship and unity. Athletes from these smaller nations demonstrate exceptional skill, determination, and dedication as they compete in a wide range of sports. As the games went on, an atmosphere of friendship and comradery overcame borders, and everyone came to celebrate the love of the sport.

As Malta hosted several European National Olympic Committees (NOCs), it served as a platform for committees to connect about what it is like in being a small state in such a competitive field of sport around the world. The European Olympic Academies (EOA), in collaboration with the Malta Olympic Committee, took this opportunity to invite delegates from the competing NOCs to discuss challenges and common situations small NOCs face. During a round table talk, commonalities about the struggles of NOCs emerged, such as not having enough resources or means for Olympic Education.



The EOA encouraged how creating a specific structure focusing on Olympic Education can help benefit Olympism in their country. The Maltese and Cypriot Olympic academies also highlighted how being part of the EOA allowed them to gather materials from other larger NOAs, with the structure being easier to implement in smaller states. One common benefit was brought up, as smaller states don't need big, complex plans to share Olympic Education like other NOCs struggle with, bringing this element to be a unique benefit when the whole younger population can be reached quicker.

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In June 2023, Malta wrote its sporting history by topping the medal table at these games for the first time - having 97 medals, 38 of which were gold. Being a small country in the world of sports is like a determined underdog defying the odds, facing giants with unwavering spirit and a relentless pursuit of excellence. It is the Olympic Movement and its values that give smaller countries the flame within them to fight for excellence, respect, and fairness in sport.

TEAM CANADA OLYMPIC DAY GRANT

Canadian Olympic Committee

On June 23rd, the Canadian Olympic Committee (COC) announced the inaugural recipients of the Team Canada Olympic Day Grant. Six Canadian schools will each receive a \$5,000 grant to support their goal of empowering students to play and stay in sport. Each successful school will also receive a 90-minute motivational speech from a Team Canada athlete.

This grant is a key driver of the Team Canada Impact Agenda, the COC's organizationwide commitment to making sport safe, inclusive, and barrier-free so more young people can play and stay in sport. The Team Canada Impact Agenda is built around three pillars -Podium, Play, and Planet - and this grant, as part of the COC's long-standing Olympic Education program, will play a critical role in transforming "play" by giving more young people access to experience the power of sport.

The grant was also inspired by Olympic Day, celebrated each year on June 23 to commemorate the founding of the modern Olympic Games. Olympic Day aims to promote the values of Olympism, encourage participation in sports, and foster a sense of unity and friendship among people worldwide.

The six schools and their winning programs are:

1- Bert Church High School (Airdrie, Alta.) - Empowering the school's women's lacrosse team and educating on Indigenous culture.

2- Centre Wellington District High School (Fergus, Ont.) - Empowering girls and genderdiverse students through the introduction of powerlifting and Olympic weightlifting programs.

3- École Nuvviti (Ivujivik, Que.) - Promoting a healthy active lifestyle by increasing access to sport while providing the necessities to participate (i.e., healthy food and drink).

4- École Parkside School (Altona, Man.) - Improving outdoor infrastructure to increase school and community access to outdoor volleyball.

5- École secondaire des Sources (Montreal, Que.) - Increasing access to an afterschool triathlon program for students.



6- Sussex Regional High School (Sussex, N.B.) - Developing a bike repair program and offering specialized biking opportunities for students with disabilities with physical therapists.

The application for the grant was open to schools this year from March 4 to April 4. The six schools were chosen out of 625 applicants by a selection committee. For more information on our Olympic Education program and the Team Canada Olympic Day Grant, please visit https://olympic.ca/education/
